



BRAKEMEN AND ENGINEERS


As a child in Indiana, we lived next to the railroad tracks. I even remember steam powered locomotives blasting their steam when passing by. Sometimes the trains would stop and we would talk to the crew members while they would tell us stories of their travels. Hobos were also present next to the tracks and they too would share stories of their adventures. In this editorial I have a train story to share with you!

There once was a train scheduled to go over the Rocky Mountains which had some pretty steep grades. The engineer had been over this route many times. An experienced crewmember, a brakeman, was new to this route as he had just been reassigned from the Midwest. The brakeman was excited for this trip as the caboose he was in was a new concept model. As the train travelled along up a steep grade the engineer felt like the train was not going as fast as he expected. He knew he had a heavy load but also knew he had carried heavier loads before and did not have this difficulty. The engineer poured on the coal and increased the throttle. When the train made it over the first grade the engineer stopped the train to check the train out. As he was walking along the cars to see what was wrong the new brakeman came running up from the back to meet him. While catching his breath he said to the engineer, "Whew! I was afraid we were not going to make it up that mountain and would slide back down. So, I clamped down on the brakes as hard as I could - just in case!"

Our journey in Physiologic Based Dentistry is a steep climb. It can become discouraging at times because it seems like there is always more to learn in order to be successful. Each dentist is the engineer of their train and their team is their crew - each has a responsibility to help the journey be successful. Just like the old steam locomotives, our trains can have multiple brake-persons responsible for various parts of our locomotive dental practice - and each one can operate a brake. Just as the brakeman in the story who felt they were helping to save the train from disaster, a team member might feel they are saving the practice from disaster when in reality their actions might prevent success.

Brake-persons can be an experienced assistant who is not familiar with PBD and listens to patients ask questions about this new "questionable" treatment. This can cause them to have doubts if they do not understand PBD themselves. A brake-person can be a hygienist who does not understand the importance of the connection between systemic diseases and many dental conditions - and how to avoid the problems.
